First Reading: Genesis 1:1-2:3

¹ In the beginning when God created the heavens and the earth, ² the earth was a formless void and darkness covered the face of the deep, while a wind from God swept over the face of the waters. ³ Then God said, 'Let there be light'; and there was light. ⁴ And God saw that the light was good; and God separated the light from the darkness. ⁵ God called the light Day, and the darkness he called Night. And there was evening and there was morning, the first day.

⁶ And God said, 'Let there be a dome in the midst of the waters, and let it separate the waters from the waters.' ⁷ So God made the dome and separated the waters that were under the dome from the waters that

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were above the dome. And it was so. ⁸ God called the dome Sky. And there was evening and there was morning, the second day.

- ⁹ And God said, 'Let the waters under the sky be gathered together into one place, and let the dry land appear.' And it was so. ¹⁰ God called the dry land Earth, and the waters that were gathered together he called Seas. And God saw that it was good. ¹¹ Then God said, 'Let the earth put forth vegetation: plants yielding seed, and fruit trees of every kind on earth that bear fruit with the seed in it.' And it was so. ¹² The earth brought forth vegetation: plants yielding seed of every kind, and trees of every kind bearing fruit with the seed in it. And God saw that it was good. ¹³ And there was evening and there was morning, the third day.
- ¹⁴ And God said, 'Let there be lights in the dome of the sky to separate the day from the night; and let them be for signs and for seasons and for days and years, ¹⁵ and let them be lights in the dome of the sky to give light upon the earth.' And it was so. ¹⁶ God made the two great lights—the greater light to rule the day and the lesser light to rule the night—and the stars. ¹⁷ God set them in the dome of the sky to give light upon the earth, ¹⁸ to rule over the day and over the night, and to separate the light from the darkness. And God saw that it was good. ¹⁹ And there was evening and there was morning, the fourth day.
- ²⁰ And God said, 'Let the waters bring forth swarms of living creatures, and let birds fly above the earth across the dome of the sky.' ²¹ So God created the great sea monsters and every living creature that moves, of every kind, with which the waters swarm, and every winged bird of every kind. And God saw that it was good. ²² God blessed them, saying, 'Be fruitful and multiply and fill the waters in the seas, and let birds multiply on the earth.' ²³ And there was evening and there was morning, the fifth day.
- ²⁴ And God said, 'Let the earth bring forth living creatures of every kind: cattle and creeping things and wild animals of the earth of every kind.' And it was so. ²⁵ God made the wild animals of the earth of every kind, and the cattle of every kind, and everything that creeps upon the ground of every kind. And God saw that it was good.
- ²⁶ Then God said, 'Let us make humankind in our image, according to our likeness; and let them have dominion over the fish of the sea, and over the birds of the air, and over the cattle, and over all the wild animals of the earth, and over every creeping thing that creeps upon the earth.'
- ²⁷ So God created humankind in his image,
 - in the image of God he created them;
 - male and female he created them.
- ²⁸ God blessed them, and God said to them, 'Be fruitful and multiply, and fill the earth and subdue it; and have dominion over the fish of the sea and over the birds of the air and over every living thing that moves upon the earth.' ²⁹ God said, 'See, I have given you every plant yielding seed that is upon the face of all the earth, and every tree with seed in its fruit; you shall have them for food. ³⁰ And to every beast of the earth, and to every bird of the air, and to everything that creeps on the earth, everything that has the breath of life, I have given every green plant for food.' And it was so. ³¹ God saw everything that he had made, and indeed, it was very good. And there was evening and there was morning, the sixth day.
- **2** Thus the heavens and the earth were finished, and all their multitude. ² And on the seventh day God finished the work that he had done, and he rested on the seventh day from all the work that he had done. ³ So God blessed the seventh day and hallowed it, because on it God rested from all the work that he had done in creation.

Gospel Reading: Matthew 6:25-34

²⁵ Therefore I tell you, do not worry about your life, what you will eat or what you will drink, or about your body, what you will wear. Is not life more than food, and the body more than clothing? ²⁶ Look at the birds of the air; they neither sow nor reap nor gather into barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you

not of more value than they? ²⁷ And can any of you by worrying add a single hour to your span of life? ²⁸ And why do you worry about clothing? Consider the lilies of the field, how they grow; they neither toil nor spin, ²⁹ yet I tell you, even Solomon in all his glory was not clothed like one of these. ³⁰ But if God so clothes the grass of the field, which is alive today and tomorrow is thrown into the oven, will he not much more clothe you—you of little faith? ³¹ Therefore do not worry, saying, "What will we eat?" or "What will we drink?" or "What will we wear?" ³² For it is the Gentiles who strive for all these things; and indeed your heavenly Father knows that you need all these things. ³³ But strive first for the kingdom of God and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well.

³⁴ 'So do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will bring worries of its own. Today's trouble is enough for today.

Sermon, Candlemas (translated to Sunday after): Rev'd Canon Eileen Harrop, 5th February 2023 (Malachi 3:1-5; Luke 2:22-40)

The special day that is referred to as Candlemas, concludes the season of Epiphany. In the coming of God through the incarnation of Jesus, God has made it possible for people to see him. In Jesus' first sermon, commonly known as 'The Beatitudes', we are told <u>who</u> are blessed 'to see God'. In Matthew, 5 verse 8, Jesus was recorded saying: "Blessed are the pure in heart, for they will see God."

We may recall that thousands of years before God came to us in Jesus, that God had instructed Moses to avert his eyes because meeting God would be too great an experience for any person to bear. Because of human sinfulness, the holiness and glory of God would have overwhelmed him. By God's grace, His coming in Jesus changed this.

The Amplified version of that particular Beatitude, says:

"Blessed [anticipating God's presence, the spiritually mature] are the pure in heart [those with integrity, moral courage, and godly character], for they will see God."

Elderly and Godly Simeon was such a spiritually mature man who had been anticipating God's presence. That very day when Jesus' parents came to the temple for 'their purification according to the law of Moses' bringing Jesus to be presented to God, Simeon was filled with the Holy Spirit. Simeon was described as being righteous and devout. He was recognised for his integrity, moral courage, and Godly character. His life had been continuously purified by the way he honoured his relationship with God, and on this day, God completed his purification filling him with his spirit. It was in this state that Simeon, who being pure in heart, is rewarded in seeing God. We are also told: 'There was also a prophet, Anna... of a great age, a widow. She never left the temple but worshipped there with fasting and prayer night and day.' Here is another person, who had valued above everything her relationship with God that led her to a pure life.

In recent years, we have watched as the world is shaken by leaders of governments, of business, of public services, who do not seem to value such purity.

The prophet Malachi has delivered to us God's explicit message about what is righteous and what is sin. God's judgement will 'bear witness against the sorcerers, against the adulterers, against those who swear falsely, against those who oppress the hired workers in their wages, the widow, and the orphan, against those who thrust aside the alien, and do not fear God.'

Those who conceive of trickery to impose evil against others are sorcerers. Those who are careless and callous about their marriage relationships and reckless in unfaithfulness are adulterers. Those leaders who proclaim promises and make vows to their people and nations but have intentionally not kept their word are those who swear falsely. All of us have known leaders of nations and of high-profile institutions who have been unashamed of these ways of leading and living. They have claimed vociferously that they are worthy with no regret for their unrighteousness.

Perhaps like you, I am imploring myself to pray fervently for our country. Listen to the next part of Malachi's words that God's judgement will fall against: 'those who oppress the hired workers in their wages; who oppress the widow, and the orphan, and those who thrust aside the alien'. In the UK, we shall soon be wondering which public service has not come out in protest for unjust wages. Friends, I cannot and will not make a personal judgement on the rights or wrongs of the protests we are witnessing because I am not that worker who is crying out. Who am I to judge who is oppressed or not? But God knows. If those who have authority and in whom power to administer justice has been given choose to oppress, let us not be surprised when God's wrath befalls. When our bishops speak out in Parliament for the vulnerable elderly, children, and the refugee, they do so because this is God's word as prophesied. Prophets of old have lost their lives on human authority for speaking truth, and even today, some are scathing against our Archbishops. But God's judgement bears witness 'against those who oppress'; 'who thrust aside the alien', and who do not fear to do this.

The Church and Christians are called to lives of purity. Integrity, morality, and Godliness should matter to us. I have no evidence that Simeon demonstrated courageous advocacy - this is a term I learnt from our Primary Schools as a Christian value. But we know that the people who knew Simeon and Anna, bore witness to their lives. Over more than 2 thousand years, all generations of Christians have also received their testimonies. Even if we have not been called to speak or act against unrighteousness and injustice, we are called to live righteously and to do justice. And like Simeon and Anna, we too can be among the pure in heart and we shall see God.

Amen
