## The Ist Week after TRINITY – NEWSLETTER 2nd – 8th June 2024

#### **Greetings from Eileen**

We will remember. On the 80th anniversary of the D-Day Landings we will remember the tactical turning point of WWII. It was a costly action but it was significant in moving the Allied Forces towards Victory in Europe. There will be a Service at Ingleton's Memorial on Sunday 9th June at 11am; and on 6th June bells will ring from our church towers in Staindrop and Gainford; and a light will be specially hung outside St John the Evangelist Church in Ingleton.





In the early hours of D-Day 6<sup>th</sup> June 1944, 24,000 paratroopers and glider-borne troops landed behind enemy lines, then a ground force of more than 130,000 troops came ashore on five beaches across a 50-mile stretch of Normandy coast. Among the Allied troops were those from the Far East including Chinese soldiers from British colonies in this sacrifice. We will remember all of them.

#### **Readings for CORPUS CHRISTI**

#### I Corinthians II:23-26

<sup>23</sup> For I received from the Lord what I also handed on to you, that the Lord Jesus on the night when he was betrayed took a loaf of bread, <sup>24</sup> and when he had given thanks, he broke it and said, 'This is my body that is for you. Do this in remembrance of me.' <sup>25</sup> In the same way he took the cup also, after supper, saying, 'This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.' <sup>26</sup> For as often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes.

#### John 6:51-58

<sup>51</sup> I am the living bread that came down from heaven. Whoever eats of this bread will live for ever; and the bread that I will give for the life of the world is my flesh.'

<sup>52</sup> The Jews then disputed among themselves, saying, 'How can this man give us his flesh to eat?' <sup>53</sup> So Jesus said to them, 'Very truly, I tell you, unless you eat the flesh of the Son of Man and drink his blood, you have no life in you. <sup>54</sup> Those who eat my flesh and drink my blood have eternal life, and I will raise them up on the last day; <sup>55</sup> for my flesh is true food and my blood is true drink. <sup>56</sup> Those who eat my flesh and drink my blood abide in me, and I in them. <sup>57</sup> Just as the living Father sent me, and I live because of the Father, so whoever eats me will live because of me. <sup>58</sup> This is the bread that came down from heaven, not like that which your ancestors ate, and they died. But the one who eats this bread will live for ever.'

### Sermon, TRINITY Sunday 26th May 2024: Rev'd Canon Eileen Harrop (Romans 8.12-17; John 3.1-17)

A particularly well-heard Bible reading at weddings is I Corinthians 13 – St Paul's timeless letter about love. We had this reading at a wedding in Ingleton yesterday. In that chapter, Paul wrote: "...as for knowledge, it will come to an end. For we know only in part... For now we see in a mirror, dimly."

This was Nicodemus' quandary in our Gospel reading. Like many people, especially the learned whose understanding is determined by physical observation, Nicodemus was unsettled because he expected his knowledge to explain what he had seen Jesus do and had heard Jesus teach. So, he came to Jesus for a private conversation, although it is likely that he would have been accompanied by trusted members of his household. Nicodemus' questions are questions about the nature of God and how God has engaged with the world – God: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

Unlike others from the council of chief priests and rabbis or of the Sanhedrin, which is the governing council of Jews of which Nicodemus was a respected member, he had not come to Jesus to catch him out. He was genuinely puzzled asking what someone today might ask us: "How can anyone be born after having grown old? Can one enter a second time into the mother's womb and be born?" Throughout the generations, people have asked the same questions about our belief in God: How can God be 3? Might not God then be as the Hindus or Greeks believe in numerous gods not only 3? Perhaps some of us have stopped trying to work that out, happy to rest in our faith.

This is what I read of someone's quandary recently: Pizza -



It comes in a **Square box**, yet when you open it; It's **round**.

And when you start eating it it's a **triangle!**Life and people are like pizza; look different, appear different and of course behave absolutely different.

There are actually many analogies or illustrations in our ordinary observations that addresses the Trinity quandary.

Looking around us gathered today, I see many of you are parents – some of you are fathers. I see also that whether you are a parent – a father or a mother – you and I are a son or a daughter. You can be both Father and Son. And because we are relational beings, what we have said or done has affected someone and become part of their being. You have affected their spirit, so that even if you are absent in person, something about you has remained with them and continues to be active in their lives. They may even call upon you in memory to inform a decision, an action; be warned or comforted.

You and I in this description are as 3 in one. Now I am pleased to say that I have not blasphemed nor guilty of heresy by saying this. Instead, it should not be surprising to us that we too are 3 in one as God is 3 in one. We are after all created by God in his image. And many of us are known by others differently: you may be the person in Tea and Chat, or the Pilgrimage leader; yet you are to your husband, his wife whom he may never have seen in the context of Tea and Chat or leading on Pilgrimage. You may be that ballroom dancer or perhaps a sportsperson or a fundraiser, who has inspired and gifted life to someone because of who you are in these ways. We may take for granted that we are each several people, yet that may be a blessed mystery too.

What we know in part in our earthly phenomena reflects God's Trinity. Water, which is essential to earthly life, is liquid – what we drink, what is in our rivers, seas, and oceans – is also steam and vapour; cloud, snow, frost, hail, and ice. Water is many things: gentle and comforting; cleansing and refreshing; hydrating to restore and sustain. Yet it is also ferocious and terrifying; fast and furious; uncontrollable and destructive.

But God Almighty, the Creator, before all things, is not the created. It is by His will and purpose that he took his triune form with specific purpose to give us life, to restore us, to make us whole and holy again. Our faith is in God who chose to be as one of us in the form of the Son. Our faith is in God who chose to instil and gift to us His Spirit, his breath of life, that even without Jesus' physical human presence, we would continue to be whole and holy not remaining sullied nor destroyed by the sin of the world.

That's where our reading from Romans comes in: "So then, brothers and sisters, we are debtors, not to the flesh, to live according to the flesh... For all who are led by the Spirit of God are children of God."

God is a mystery only as much as we are a mystery, because God has revealed himself to us in Jesus and by His Spirit in us. Let us not live as if we do not know that we are children of God. Instead, live as we ought, in the knowledge and understanding that we belong and live in the eternal and present God, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. Amen.

**A footnote:** Geoff Taylor delivered a Trinity Homily in St Mary's, Gainford. In his message, he shared an important aspect of The Trinity – that Christians since the time of Council of Nicea that was overseen by the Christian Emperor Constantine, have been united around the Creed, which declares our faith in the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. That we are also One in the Body of Christ is echoed in the all-encompassing nature of each part of the Trinity and Oneness of the Trinity. Geoff's homily presented the congregation with a memorable take-away as Geoff declared the Emperor Constantine to be a Yorkshireman! Constantine was proclaimed emperor by his army while in York in ad 306.
