"The United Nations represents the world's commitment to uphold human dignity, safeguard every human life

However imperfect they may be, the institutions responsible for upholding and monitoring the rules of war — the UN, the International Court of Justice, the International Criminal Court and others. On United Nations Day, I continue to pray for determined action among all nations to build a more just and stable world, one that reflects an unshakable belief in the equal value of person."

A colleague, Rev'd Prebendary Dr Godfrey Kesari of Chichester Diocese has written this **thoughtful piece for Black History Month**.

The recent racist name-callings, riots and violence against people of colour have shown that racism is not history yet. Evidently the emergence of England as an integrated multiethnic and multicultural society is still a work in progress. However, it was heartening to note that the overwhelming majority of people deplored and condemned the racially motivated attacks. Just as racist violence is pointless, blaming people of colour for the country's social and economic ills is also pointless.

Black History Month is a time to relearn that skin colour is very shallow. Pigmentation does not make or define a human. BHM is an opportunity to bridge racial divides. Like it or not, the cohesive power of our common humanity and shared sufferings and joys is at the core of our existence.

The Bible is clear that we are all made in the image of God. We must set great store by our character and not at all by our appearance. While we all need our own space to live as individuals, we also need to know that we are one, in God in Christ, despite differences in our skin colour. It should follow from this that educational and job opportunities must be provided to all, irrespective of their colour. Sharing and altruism are the pillars on which a good society is built.

In a deeper sense, the church exists to prepare people for the kingdom of heaven. It should do all that it can to make itself look as close as possible to heaven. For God, diversity is at the heart of the kingdom of heaven. This is echoed in Revelation 7.9. People of all tribes, nations and languages are welcomed by Jesus. It is now only a matter of time everyone joins in the celebration and joyous singing and praise to God together. Communities exclusive in terms of race are a far cry from the kingdom. It is when we understand and act on this compelling call, riots will cease and we will begin to witness a foretaste of heaven here and now.

Readings (Except at Ingleton, where the service remembers All Souls)

2 Timothy 3:14-4:5

¹⁴ But as for you, continue in what you have learned and firmly believed, knowing from whom you learned it, ¹⁵ and how from childhood you have known the sacred writings that are able to instruct you for salvation through faith in Christ Jesus. ¹⁶ All scripture is inspired by God and is useful for teaching, for reproof, for correction, and for training in righteousness, ¹⁷ so that everyone who belongs to God may be proficient, equipped for every good work.

4 In the presence of God and of Christ Jesus, who is to judge the living and the dead, and in view of his appearing and his kingdom, I solemnly urge you: ² proclaim the message; be persistent whether the time is favourable or unfavourable; convince, rebuke, and encourage, with the utmost patience in teaching. ³ For the time is coming when people will not put up with sound doctrine, but having itching ears, they will accumulate for themselves teachers to suit their own desires, ⁴ and will turn away from listening to the truth and wander away to myths. ⁵ As for you, always be sober, endure suffering, do the work of an evangelist, carry out your ministry fully.

John 5.36-47

^{36b} The works that the Father has given me to complete, the very works that I am doing, testify on my behalf that the Father has sent me. ³⁷ And the Father who sent me has himself testified on my behalf. You have never heard his voice or seen his form, ³⁸ and you do not have his word abiding in you, because you do not believe him whom he has sent.

³⁹ 'You search the scriptures because you think that in them you have eternal life; and it is they that testify on my behalf. ⁴⁰ Yet you refuse to come to me to have life. ⁴¹ I do not accept glory from human beings. ⁴² But I know that you do not have the love of God in you. ⁴³ I have come in my Father's name, and you do not accept me; if another comes in his own name, you will accept him. ⁴⁴ How can you believe when you accept glory from one another and do not seek the glory that comes from the one who alone is God? ⁴⁵ Do not think that I will accuse you before the Father; your accuser is Moses, on whom you have set your hope. ⁴⁶ If you believed Moses, you would believe me, for he wrote about me. ⁴⁷ But if you do not believe what he wrote, how will you believe what I say?'
